May Topic

The theme for the month of May will be the world around us and mini beasts.

The children will be learning about:

- animals around the garden,
- that insects have six legs and spiders have eight.
- that they live under stones or plant pots, the life cycle of flowers and animals.
- That the weather is warm in summer and we have to wear summer clothes and sun cream.

We will celebrate our mummies as it is the month of May.

Jumpers/ Spare Clothes

Please check that your child's jumpers are clearly labelled with their names as the weather is improving and the children are taking their jumpers off during the day. Children are able to wear summer dresses or shorts to school during the good weather but please ensure that their shoes will allow them to enjoy outdoor play safely.

Please check the labels on the jumpers as a number of jumpers have gone missing.

Please also return any outstanding items of clothing belonging to the school, which may have been used if your child had to be changed.

Preparing for Primary School

Now that the sun is shining, and we have the longer days we are thinking of summer and after summer . . . comes P.1. The children have been working so hard and given the unusual last few years that we have had they show great resilience, working hard every day and have made their teachers proud. Some children are continuing to develop their **grip and control of pencils and scissors**. These are important skills to practice in preparation for P.1.

We continue to support the boys and girls in developing their **number skills, counting skills and shape recognition.**

Numeral recognition: Can your child identify some numerals? Numbers are all around us - can they spot their age? Can they identify the number that comes next when it is their birthday?

Counting skills: Can your child count 1-10? Do they point to each thing as they count i.e. when counting 5 Lego bricks will they count 12?

Shape recognition: Take a shape and talk with your child about how it looks and how it feels e.g. a circle has a smooth edge, no jaggy bits or corners. A triangle has 3 jaggy points. A rectangle looks like a door!

What shapes can you find around the house or when you are out for a walk?

Name Awareness: Can they identify their name and are they starting to form the letters in their name. Why not use chalk outside on the ground or on a fence to write their name or letters - send them on a name hunt to find the letters in their name around the garden - then paint over them with a paint brush using a bucket of water.
